#### WE READY OURSELVES TO WORSHIP

This week we are going to be exploring another absolutely foundational biblical teaching, the fall of humanity in Genesis 3. It's hard to overstate the importance of this chapter and this doctrine as the fall of humanity is an absolutely pervasive reality.

But what did the fall actually do to humanity?

Our confession of faith summarizes it succinctly in this way: Q. 23. Into what estate did the fall bring mankind? A. The fall brought mankind into an **estate of sin** and **misery**.

The fall brought humanity into a state of sin. This one is a little more straightforward in that it teaches that human beings cannot escape sin. We sin every day in thought, word, and deed. Even our best acts are tainted by the sin which has been a part of our existence since we were conceived in our mother's womb.

Unfortunately, another idea about human sinfulness is way more popular today, it is the idea that human beings are basically good and when left to choose will more often than not choose the good. This is the basic viewpoint of secular humanism and that which underlines almost every anti-christian worldview in the world today.

The second thing the fall did was to bring humanity into a state of misery. This one is a little more difficult to understand. It doesn't mean that every human being is miserable all the time. It does mean that every human being is now subject to the effects of the fall in a pervasive sense. Oftentimes we call this "brokenness." That is, there isn't anything in the world that isn't corrupted by sin. Sometimes we speak of this misery in terms of human frailty, human finiteness, and human faltering. These things come from sin and are actually sin but aren't necessarily actual volitional sins. They are the products of the fall. So human beings are subject to the sins of others, they age and their bodies grow weak, their DNA strands are broken, they get diseases, they experience grave sadness and pain in a myriad of ways.

Surely no one would insist that a person who is born with Down syndrome has sinned in that they have committed an actual transgression, neither would we say that a child whose parents had divorced had sinned when they experience fear and confusion resulting from the breakdown of their parent's marriage. And yet, Down syndrome and divorce are in the world because of sin and so we lament their presence while at the same time rejoicing in the way that they can be redeemed while we wait for Jesus to return.
