What is the Difference Between Predestination and Election? Rev. Dr. Kevin Deyoung (From TGC: 8/13/10)

I had someone ask me this question recently. My short answer is: in popular usage, not a lot. The terms election and predestination are often used interchangeably, both referring to God's gracious decree whereby he chooses some for eternal life. In Romans 8:30 Paul speaks of those whom God has predestined, called, justified, and (in the end) glorified. In 8:33 Paul references "the elect," apparently a synonym for the predestined ones described a few verses earlier.

A sharp distinction between the two words is not warranted from Scripture, but if there is a distinction to be made, predestination is the general term for God's sovereign ordaining, while election is the specific term for God choosing us in Christ before the foundation of the world. That is, predestination is the broader category of which election is the smaller subset. Calvin defined predestination as "God's eternal decree, by which he compacted with himself what he willed to become of each man...Therefore, as any man has been created to one or the other of these ends, we speak of him as predestined to life or to death" (Inst. III.xxi.5). For Calvin, predestination encompasses the entire eternal decree. Election and reprobation, then, represent two different aspects of the decree. The Canons of Dort Article 1 makes the same distinctions.

This delineation is not without merit. The "elect" is always a positive designation in Scripture (e.g., Matt. 24:31; Titus 1:1), suggesting that election implies eternal life (though Rom 9:11 may be an exception to this rule). Predestination, on the other hand, can be used more broadly.

Herod and Pontius Pilate, along with the Gentiles and people of Israel, did to Jesus what God's "plan had *predestined* to take place" (Acts 4:27-28). Indeed, all of our days are written in God's book before one of them comes to pass (Psalm 139:16). Every form of prosperity and affliction comes to us not by chance, but from God's fatherly hand (Heidelberg Catechism Q/A 27). Or as Augustine put it, "The will of God is the necessity of all things."

Does this mean we are "predestined" to marry so-and-so or take a certain job? In one sense, looking back at God's providential care, we can say "Yes, that was God's plan for my life." And yet this notion of divine superintendence is not meant to undercut personal initiative and responsibility. Everything happens after the counsel of God's will (Eph. 1:11), but this is no excuse to neglect the use of means, nor is it a reason to think every decision we make is automatically pleasing to God. God's sovereign unalterable will of decree is not to be confused with his violable will of desire.



MISSION UPDATE

Crates for Ukraine

As you know, Ukraine has been in a war for over 100 days and the needs are extensive. Through MTW we have a plan in place to collect and send items through a courier (volunteers from Trinity and other PCA churches in MO) and place supplies into the hands of missionaries in Krakow, Poland, who will hand deliver the items to the areas most in need. This will be the most efficient way to steward God's relief funds and bypasses weeks of shipping delays, high import taxes, and weeks in customs. We are not in this alone. Several churches will be participating and partnering to make this happen.

Round 1 - Items due TODAY

Old Orchard Presbyterian Church in Webster Groves has our first courier. Providentially, her job is sending her to Europe and she will make a stop in Poland. She has volunteered to bring 6 crates with her. She will be leaving this week with the supplies donated by Trinity and other churches. We have been praying that we can fill 6 large Sterilite Footlockers with items needed. As mentioned above, we are not doing this alone and other churches will be partnering to help our brothers and sisters in Ukraine.

If you didn't get a chance to help with the crates leaving this week, we will be collecting for another set of crates to be delivered in Aug. More info will be coming soon with updated lists and details of items needed.

Round 2 - Mid to Late August

More information in the weeks to come. We will continue to collect items and fill crates throughout the summer. We have identified 2 possible couriers, who will be flying out mid to late August.
